Hon. Barry C. Dozor, Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Delaware County

Judge Dozor was appointed to the Court of Common Pleas in 2001 and elected for a full judicial term in January 2004. In 2013, he was retained for an additional judicial term of 10 years. A lifelong resident of Delaware County, Judge Dozor is a graduate of Haverford High School, West Chester University (B.A.) and the Widener University School of Law (J.D.). He has attended and was awarded a Certificate from the National Judicial College and participates in many academic and professional forums.
